

IS THAT A FACT?

"Hackney" is a fourteenth-century word for "a trotting horse, used chiefly for driving." How, then, could the word "hackneyed" come to mean "trite" (lacking in freshness or originality)?

Hackney, as an adjective, was used to mean "kept for public hire" around 1589. As early as 1596, the connotation of hackney became "to make common or frequent use of" something. Archaic usage of hackney was "to make sophisticated." The common folk, however, felt that the "sophisticated" gentry was "dulled by excessive indulgence of such things as food and drink." It was probably only natural to associate the English breed of rather compact, usually chestnut, bay or brown high-stepping horses with the gentry, because they were the people who could afford to own or, at least, to rent carriages. Carriages were often hitched to trotters known for their particular gait in which the legs moved in diagonal pairs.

Around 1660, a hackney coach, or four-wheeled six-seater carriage drawn by two horses, was one kept for hire and a hackney became known as "one that works for hire." A "drudge" was one who had to do menial work, and a servant was considered a drudge because he was obliged to do routine, boring work around the person of a master or personal employer. The job of a servant who drove a hackney coach, then, was supposed to be dull, irksome, unoriginal and even monotonous work.

So, there you have it! Around 1749, the term "hackney" appears to have been used to mean "lacking in freshness or originality," which is why "trite," meaning "boring from much use, and not fresh or original," became synonymous. And that's a fact!

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


